the recent upsurge of fresh historical research concerning the early years of psychoanalysis has left many professional readers struggling to keep abreast of the latest findings and more than a little perplexed as to what it all adds up to. Freud and the history of psychoanalysis addresses this state of affairs by providing in a single volume original essays by fourteen leading historians of psychoanalysis and philosophers of science. It is the most impressive collection of contemporary Freud scholarship yet to appear in print. The contributions span virtually the entirety of Freud's career from his coming of professional age in Charcot's Paris to his clandestine rendezvous in the Harz mountains with members of the committee more than 30 years later. The collection also encompasses a host of conceptual issues ranging from Freud's theory of dream formation to the impact of his conflicting masculine and feminine identifications on his attitude toward treatment. Freud and the politics of psychoanalysis is a sympathetic critique of Freud's work tracing its political content and context from his early writings on hysteria to his late essays on civilization and religion. Brunner's central claim is that politics is a pervasive and essential component of all of Freud's discourse since Freud viewed both the psyche and society primarily as constellations of power and domination. Brunner shows that when read politically, Freud's discourse can be seen to unite mechanics and meaning into a plausible, fruitful and internally consistent theory of the mind/therapy.

family and society part one deals with the medical and political background of freud s work it explains how freud postulated mental principles that were the same for all races and nations the second part is concerned with the logic and language of freud s theory of the mind brunner also details how freud introduced dynamics of dominance and subjugation into the very core of the psyche part three addresses dynamics of power in the clinical setting which freud forged out of a curious blend of authoritarian and liberal elements brunner focuses on how this setting creates an arena for verbal politics he also examines various social factors that influenced the therapeutic practice of psychoanalysis such as class gender and education part four explores freud s analysis of the family and large scale social institutions though brunner is critical of the authoritarian bias in freud s social theory he suggests that it provides a useful vocabulary to unmask hidden psychological aspects of domination and subjection this is an essential book for those interested in the history of ideas and psychoanalysis josu brunner is senior lecturer at the buchmann faculty of law and the cohn institute for the history and philosophy of science and ideas both at tel aviv university born in zorich switzerland he has been living in israel for most of the last three decades he is author of numerous publications on the history and politics of psychoanalysis and contemporary political theory

the work of sigmund freud has penetrated almost every area of literary theory and cultural studies as well as contemporary culture encouraging and preparing readers to approach freud s original texts this guide ensures that readers of all levels will find freud accessible challenging and of continued relevance

there is extensive literature on freud and language however there is very little that looks at freud s use of the spoken word in freud and the spoken word speech as a key to the unconscious ana maría rizzuto contends that freud s focus on the intrapsychic function and meaning of patients words allowed him to use the new psychoanalytic method of talking to gain access to unconscious psychic life in creating the first talking therapy freud began a movement that still underpins how psychoanalysts understand and use the spoken word in clinical treatment and advance psychoanalytic theory with careful and critical reference to freud s own work this book draws out conclusions on the nature of verbal exchanges between analyst and patient ana maría rizzuto begins with a close look at freud s early monograph on aphasia suggesting that freud was motivated by his need to understand the disturbed speech phenomena observed in three of the patients described in studies on hysteria she then turns to an examination of how freud integrated the spoken word into his theories as well as how he actually talked with his patients looking again at the studies in hysteria and continuing with the dora case the rat man and the wolf man in these chapters the author interprets how freud s report of his own words shed light on the varying relationships he had with his patients when and how he was able to follow his own recommendations for treatment and when another factor therapeutic zeal or the wish to prove a theory appeared to interfere in communication between the two parties in the analysis freud and the spoken word examines freud s work with a critical eye the book explores his contribution in relation to the spoken word enhances its significance and challenges its shortcomings it is written for psychoanalysts psychotherapists freud s scholars and academics interested in his views on the words spoken in life and in psychoanalysis argentine born ana maría rizzuto trained in psychoanalysis in boston and was for forty years in the pine psychoanalytic center faculty and is training and supervisory analyst emerita she has made significant contributions to the psychoanalysis of religious experience and has written in national and international journals about the significance of words in the clinical situation she has written three books and lectured about her work in north america latin america europe and japan

this book will reward scholars across a number of disciplines literary studies trauma studies psychoanalysis and psychology and philosophy choice this book argues that freud s mapping of trauma as a scene is central to both his clinical interpretation of his patients symptoms and his construction of successive theoretical models and concepts to explain the power of such scenes in his

patients lives this attention to the scenic form of trauma and its power in determining symptoms leads to freud s break from the neurological model of trauma he inherited from charcot it also helps to explain the affinity that freud and many since him have felt between psychoanalysis and literature and artistic production more generally and the privileged role of literature at certain turning points in the development of his thought it is freud s scenography of trauma and fantasy that speaks to the student of literature and painting

many of the leading freudian analysts including in the early days jung adler reich and rank attempted to link the writings of nietzsche with the clinical work of freud but what was nietzsche to freud an intuitive anticipation a precursor a rival psychologist assoun moves beyond the seduction of these attractive analogues to a deeper analysis of the relation between these two figures

whether sigmund freud s theory precludes serious engagement with psychoanalytic theory for those professing faith in the god of the judeo christian tradition has been controversial for years coming to terms with freud s theory has proved difficult for religious believers because of his stance that religious faith is little more than psychological projection building on the work of philosopher and theologian paul ricoeur psychoanalyst ana maria rizzuto and feminist theorist judith van herik author kirk a bingaman demonstrates that it is possible and even advantageous for believers to hold their religious faith in dialectical tension with psychoanalysis bingaman shows how freud s critique of religion can enrich and strengthen rather than destroy the faith of the believer what emerges from the author s argument is a creative method for living within the emotional and spiritual tension that develops whenever our belief system is challenged or disrupted

freud wrote 76 letters to the dutch psychoanalyst jeanne lampl de groot between 1921 and 1939 these letters are personable lively and compassionate and convey his respect and caring for jeanne who was his patient pupil and eventually his esteemed professional colleague the letters are sociohistorical documents that contain freud s thoughts about pertinent issues in psychoanalysis and the interwar sociopolitical situation in vienna and germany jeanne lampl de groot was an internationally known psychoanalyst who published extensively on psychoanalytic theory and practice she regularly wrote long letters to freud when residing outside of vienna seeking his advice on personal and professional matters and discussing with him her evolving ideas about psychoanalysis including her disagreement with freud about female sexual development it is unfortunate that jeanne had her letters to freud destroyed because it sometimes makes freud s somewhat elliptical responses difficult to place in context for example it is quite probable that she wrote detailed descriptions of her husband s

emotional issues which freud then merely alluded to because we don't know the specifics of what she wrote his responses remain ambiguous and therefore problematic to translate nonetheless freud's responses do reveal a great deal about jeanne and her passion for psychoanalysis the book also includes several of her letters to her parents which allows the reader to get to know jeanne's intelligent thoughtful voice her thoughts about the evolving science of psychoanalysis her experience during her psychoanalysis with freud and her concerns about the rise of anti semitism in austria and germany this book introduces to its readers a very personable freud and provides insight into his thoughts about the development of critical psychoanalytic concepts such as the death drive masochism lay analysis and his changing views on the length of a psychoanalysis we also hear about historical events in the 1920s and 1930s as we witness freud and lampl de groot move through their personal and professional lives with dignity and perseverance

volume 2 of a three part analysis of ferenczi by freud it demonstrates the characteristic inconsistencies of the two men with freud restrained and ferenczi more effusive and revealing it also records the use and misuse of analysis their personal lives

sigmund freud's relationship with otto rank was the most constant close and significant of his professional life freud considered rank to be the most brilliant of his disciples the two collaborated on psychoanalytic writing practice and politics rank was the managing director of freud's publishing house and after several years helping freud update his masterpiece the interpretation of dreams rank contributed two chapters his was the only other name ever to be listed on the title page this complete collection of the known correspondence between the two brings to life their twenty year collaboration and their painful break the 250 letters compiled by e james lieberman and robert kramer humanize and dramatize psychoanalytic thinking practice and organization from 1906 through 1925 the letters concern not just the work and trenchant contemporaneous observations of freud and rank but also their friendships supporters rivals families travels and other personal and professional matters most interestingly the letters trace rank's growing independence the father son schism over rank's anti oedipal heresy his surprising reconciliation with freud and the moment when they parted ways permanently a candid picture of how the pioneers of modern psychotherapy behaved with their patients colleagues and families and each other the correspondence between freud and rank

demonstrates how psychoanalysis developed in relation to early twentieth century science art philosophy and politics a rich primary source on psychiatry history and culture the letters of sigmund freud and otto rank is a cogent and powerful narrative of early psychoanalysis and its two most important personalities

in this volume paul roazen examines different national responses to freud and the beginnings of psychoanalysis he examines freud s work in the contexts of law society and class as well as other forms of psychology encountering freud includes a brilliant essay on freud and the question of psychoanalysis contribution to radical thought in contrast to the conservative tradition roazen takes up the extravagant claims of marcuse and reich and sees the risks of then overglamorization of the beginnings of psychoanalysis as a profession roazen views the legacies of harry stack sullivan helene deutsch and erik h erikson as less rich because their work conformed to the social status quo he sees freud s inability to avoid an ambiguous outcome as a lack of concern with normality and a refusal to own up to the wide variety of psychological solutions he found both therapeutically tolerable and humanly desirable roazen concludes with a series of explorations on the dichotomies freud left behind clinical discoveries versus philosophical standpoints the relationship of normality to nihilism and a defense of a therapeutic setting based on trained specialists versus a therapeutic approach encouraging self expression this is a volume that utilizes a sharp focus on freud and his followers and dissenters to explore the question of political psychology at one end and psych history at the other end of analysis

from 1953 to 1980 jacques lacan sought to accomplish a return to freud beyond post freudianism he defined this return as a new covenant with the meaning of the freudian discovery each year through his teaching he brought about this return what was at stake in this renewal

this book draws on a number of freud s lesser known works to explore psychoanalytic perspectives on memory mourning and repetition it is remarkable that freud in his speculations on the human psyche often took his point of departure in an insignificant detail it might be a lapse of memory or a detail in a piece of art from here he uncovered the many layers of the psyche its complex structure and the processing of meaning right to the limit of understanding at this point freud s exploration encountered the unknown an internal outland as difficult to acknowledge as the external reality freud did not invent the unconscious but he demonstrated how it works the unconscious according to freud does not exist but insists on making itself visible the eleven essays in this book draw a picture of the critical humanistic thinking so characteristic of freud his concepts and suppositions were the result of many years speculations based on observation experience and ideas and although they are marked by the time and culture from which they emerged they demonstrate a revolutionary knowledge of the psyche transcending the knowledge of his time in her reading of the chosen texts the author has chosen the position of a contemporary interpretation examining how psychoanalytic work on the topics of memory mourning and repetition has changed since freud and how these themes remain of crucial importance in contemporary psychoanalytic theory this book intersperses theory with clinical practice it will be of great interest to training and practicing psychoanalysts as well as scholars of art literature and sociology

volume 3 of the freud appraisals and reappraisals series continues in the tradition of its illustrious predecessors presenting readers with the fruits of continuing scholarship into the life of sigmund freud and the relationship of this life to the discovery and presentation of psychoanalytic theory in the fascinating essay that opens this volume john kerr shows freud s death instinct of 1920 to be the denouement of freud s continuing preoccupation with jung and the theoretical revisions of the zurich school in the person and writings of sabina spielrein jung s little known protege and one time lover from zurich he finds an actual embodiment of the link between freud s reaction to jung and his subsequent introduction of the death instinct having shown that spielrein truly stands between freud and jung in important respects kerr goes on to argue that freud s beyond the pleasure principle cannot be dissociated from the theoretical clinical and political issues that bear the weight of the freud jung relationship peter swales follows with his historical reconstruction of freud s encounter with the katharina of the studies on hysteria having discovered the identity of this early patient swales proceeds to offer a comprehensive account of her family s origins circumstances history and the subsequent contact with freud this account the product of a decade of research ultimately yields a panoramic view of the cultural professional and intellectual world of the early freud robert holt s concluding essay on freud s adolescent readings offers critical summaries of three of the major works that freud read on his own as a gymnasium student in the early 1870s holt then explores the probable impact of these works on freud which is to say on a youth with freud s intellectual endowment philosophical leanings and cultural background in his introductory essay text context and freud editor paul stepansky links the essays of kerr swales and holt as complementary meditations on the relation between text and context in the history of ideas for kerr swales and holt he writes text poses questions that only context can address though context in its turn implicates the analysis of other texts in which in their turn call forth yet other aspects of context the regress may appear infinite but it is a reality of historical inquiry and it is the charge of the historian of ideas to show that it need not be vicious
